History of BPC

The San Francisco Bay, the largest estuary on the Pacific Coast and the second-largest estuary in the US, has an average depth of 12 feet.

In order for Northern California Ports and Terminals to meet the import and export shipping demands of this region's economy, the 17th largest in the world, shipping channels must be dredged frequently to maintain adequate navigation depths. Historically, over six million cubic yards of sediment were dredged annually and aquatically disposed at a small number of authorized sites within the Bay, including a location near Alcatraz Island. However, it became apparent in the 1980s that sediments disposed at Alcatraz were not dispersing throughout the Bay, but rather creating a mound in the water, presenting a navigational hazard. Additionally, the Bay was being rapidly filled, its water acreage decreasing by as much as 4 square miles per year. Concern over the filling in of the Bay and its wetlands led to the formation of the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) in 1965 in order to regulate Bay fill and ensure adequate public access and responsible use of the Bay and shoreline.

Environmental groups were also becoming increasingly aware of and concerned by potential impacts of dredging and dredged material disposal on the water quality and sensitive fish habitats within the Bay. As a result of increasing public pressure and evolving regulatory policies, the federal, state and local agencies with authority over different aspects of dredging and disposal -- including the US Army Corps of Engineers, the State and Regional Water Quality Control Boards, the Environmental Protection Agency, NOAA Fisheries, the State Lands Commission, and the Bay Conservation and Development Commission-- began to apply greater scrutiny to permitting of dredge projects. The number of agencies and regulatory requirements involved with each project became cumbersome, leading to frequent disagreements between regulatory agencies, environmental interest groups, and the dredging community over how to balance dredging and disposal needs with environmental quality. The resulting impasse caused by project-by-project and agency-by-agency engagement significantly slowed the frequency of dredging and became known as "mudlock."

In 1983, the Bay Planning Coalition (BPC) was founded with a mission to "advocate balanced regulation and use of Bay-Delta resources." In response to the cumbersome permit process, and the imposition of extensive and at times overly burdensome permit conditions resulting in unwarranted cost increases, delays, and project uncertainties, BPC was formed to ensure balanced use of the Bay for both conservation and social-economic purposes. BPC also sought in part to be a counter-balance to BCDC, as many in the maritime community felt that BCDC was reaching beyond its legislative mandate. A non-profit entity representing dredging operators, ports, development firms, recreational users of the Bay shoreline, BPC spoke with a unified voice in tackling the regulatory and environmental challenges while meeting the navigational needs of the maritime industry in the Bay Area.

From 1990 to 2000, BPC served as a catalyst for the development of the state-federal Long Term Management Strategy for Dredged Material Disposal in San Francisco Bay (LTMS). The goal of the LTMS was to increase the use of dredged material as a resource by promoting beneficial re-use options and establish a cooperative permitting framework for dredging and disposal applications. The San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission, the San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board, the California Environmental Protection Agency, and the US Army Corps of Engineers came

together to form the Dredged Material Management Office (DMMO), a coordinated dredging and disposal permit application review program.

In 2001, the LTMS was adopted, culminating a 12-year collaborative effort between the BPC and the state and federal regulatory agencies. The LTMS involved a streamlined best management practices approach for dredgers and establishment of the DMMO one-stop permit shop.

The work of BPC over the last 30 years has led to an improvement of the permit process, shortened wait times for project construction, cost savings, the integration of dredging and wetlands restoration, and more. Specific achievements include:

- Productive negotiations with the Water Board during the development of their Total Maximum Daily Load requirements in order to establish reasonable alternative waste allocations for dredgers.
- Addressing dredging delays caused by significantly reduced seasonal work periods ("work windows") established by resource agencies to protect endangered species.
- Successful advocacy to achieve the Port of Oakland's -50 foot deepening project.
- Coordination with the U.S. EPA to diligently review historical sediment quality data in order to approve a science based reduction in costly testing requirements.
- Lobbying for Congressional funding of key LTMS programs aimed at efficient dredged material management planning and the sponsoring of environmental studies necessary to address data gaps identified during the development of the LTMS.
- An amendment of the Bay Plan that properly limited the authority of BCDC to protect shoreline interests while addressing the important issues of climate change and sea level rise
- The elimination of unauthorized State Lands Commission fees on dredging and streamlining of dredging and mining lease procedures.
- Participating in the founding of the San Francisco Bay Wetland Joint Venture to advocate and
 establish a wetland restoration program which would coordinate wetland restoration with willing
 landowner and dredging projects that could deliver fill necessary to achieve habitat goals of these
 projects
- A Bay Area Seaport Air Emissions Inventory project conducted in collaboration with the Bay Area Quality Improvement District (BAAQMD) and important work on the Maritime Air Quality Improvement Plan at the Port of Oakland

BPC regards collaboration as key to achieving a fair and expeditious permit process with governmental agencies, environmental organizations, private industry and many others to address and resolve all stakeholder concerns.

Navigating mandatory requirements, passionate and divergent interests, and conflicting views, BPC has used reliable science and built strong relationships and powerful advocacy to work as a true Coalition for the benefit of economic and environmental vitality and balance in the great San Francisco Bay Region.

In recent years, BPC activities have expanded to cover not only the permit process, but also essential planning, communication and consensus-building related to navigation and dredging, water and air quality, energy and water supply, transportation, and wetlands and wildlife issues. BPC is involved in advocating for regional, state and federal policies to secure necessary funding for the US Army Corps of Engineers to carry out essential dredging of harbors and waterways in the Bay and Delta, and is pushing for the expansion of beneficial reuse of dredged sediment for the purpose of restoring wetlands and increasing flood and sea level rise protection.
