## LIKELY VOTERS FAVOR SCALED-DOWN WATER BOND

Two public opinion polls commissioned jointly by the California Alliance for Jobs, The Nature Conservancy (TNC) and Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) show that a scaled-down water bond has a significantly better chance of obtaining voter approval than the \$11.1 billion bond currently slated for the November 2014 ballot.

The two polls were conducted back-to-back by JMM Research from July 28 through August 4. The first poll tested the response of 800 likely voters for the \$11.14 billion water bond that was initially placed on the November 2010 ballot but, due to subsequent actions by the Legislature, is now scheduled for the upcoming November General Election. The second poll tested the response of 600 likely voters for a smaller, \$6.9 billion bond.

A key finding of the polling indicates that, while the state's prolonged drought has increased voter concerns about the availability of water supplies, voters are nevertheless cautious about how much the state should obligate itself in new bond spending to improve and upgrade water facilities.

Another key finding shows that the credibility Governor Jerry Brown has gained with voters on fiscal issues could have significant impact on the success or failure of a potential water bond.

## Summary of poll results

Increasing water supplies for drought relief was "very important" to 80 percent of likely voters, eclipsed only by 85 percent of voters who indicated that "improving the economy and creating jobs" was very important.

When presented with two options for a water bond to finance water system improvements, a bare 51 percent majority of likely voters indicated support for an \$11 billion bond versus 31 percent opposed, with 18 percent expressing no opinion. When presented with a \$6.9 billion water bond option, 58 percent indicated support with 26 percent opposed and 16 percent undecided.

When presented with the actual ballot label for Proposition 43, the \$11.14 billion water bond that has been posted on the Secretary of State's website, 50 percent of respondents indicated they would likely vote "YES," 36 percent would likely vote "NO" and 14 percent had no opinion.

After hearing arguments in favor of the \$11.14 billion water bond, support edged up by only 1 percent to 51 percent. However, after hearing arguments against the water bond, the numbers reversed, with support dropping to 34 percent and opposition increasing to 51 percent. The most persuasive argument against the \$11.14 billion bond was: "Governor Jerry Brown opposes this bond measure because the

state can't afford it. The Governor would like to eliminate many projects and reduce the total bond by half – to \$6.9 billion."

The second poll, which tested only a scaled-down bond, showed that 56 percent of likely voters supported the initial concept of a \$6.9 billion water bond, with 27 percent opposing and 17 percent indicating no opinion. These numbers were consistent with the initial concept question for a \$6.9 billion bond posed in the first poll.

When respondents were presented with a hypothetical ballot label for a \$6.9 billion water bond, 56 percent of likely voters indicated they would vote "YES," 32 percent said they would vote "NO" and 12 percent had no opinion. After positive and negative arguments, support for a \$6.9 billion bond comes in at 44 percent, with 41 percent opposed and 15 percent expressing no opinion.

"With the timing and its focus on likely voters, we believe this polling contains the most relevant data available on where voters stand regarding a potential water bond in the November election," said Jim Earp, executive director of the California Alliance for Jobs. "The existing \$11 billion water bond – particularly if it doesn't have the Governor's support – is highly unlikely to pass in November. Conversely, even though the margin of support for a smaller bond is close right now, there are no undecided votes in an actual election. Agreement in the Legislature and strong support by the Governor for a scaled-down water bond should capture the majority of the 15 percent who are currently undecided, leading to a solid majority in November."

"These polling results indicate, once again, that while voters are drought-aware in 2014, they are also debt-aware"," said Tim Quinn, executive director of ACWA. "It is critical this year that we move forward on a comprehensive water policy for California and a successful water bond is the best way to do this. Everyone involved, from the governor to legislators to stakeholders, should be prepared to negotiate a smaller water bond that adequately funds key projects and has a significantly greater chance of passage."

"The continuing drought and public support for investments in water present an important opportunity to put California on a path to more sustainable water management," said Jay Ziegler, Director of Policy & External Affairs of the Nature Conservancy. "A successful bond needs to strike a balance in addressing our water needs and protecting environmental values."

WATER BOND. FUNDING FOR WATER QUALITY, SUPPLY, TREATMENT, AND STORAGE PROJECTS. Authorizes \$11.14 billion dollars in general obligation bonds for state water supply infrastructure projects, including surface and groundwater storage, ecosystem and watershed protection and restoration, and Bay-Delta Estuary sustainability.
