The State Coastal Conservancy's vision is of a beautiful, restored, and accessible coast for current and future generations of Californians.








## 2024 Climate Bond \$10 billion






## Coastal Flood Management \$350 million

- Includes river flooding at the coast
- Developed shoreline areas, including transportation and ports
- Multiple-benefit
- Improve public safety
- Include shoreline resilience with nature or nature-based features





## Coastal Resilience \$415 million incl. \$85 million for SF Bay projects

- Protect and restore coastal lands and habitats
- Natural infrastructure to minimize coastal flooding, erosion, and runoff
- Restore coastal land on formerly fossil-fueled powerplants
- Trails and public access facilities
- Lower-cost Coastal Accommodations
- SF Bay Area Conservancy Program and SF Bay Restoration Authority

### Wildfire Resilience \$33.5 million

# Addressing equity and benefiting systemically-excluded communities

40% of funding will provide "meaningful and direct benefits" to disadvantaged communities and vulnerable populations.

At least 10% of the 40% to benefit severely disadvantaged communities.

### SCC's Project Selection Criteria

#### Project:

- Is a good investment of State resources
- Helps accomplish our Strategic Plan
- Includes a serious effort to engage tribes
- Benefits will be sustainable or resilient over the project lifespan
- Delivers multiple benefits and significant positive impact
- Was (or will be) planned with meaningful community engagement and broad community support

### SCC's Application Process

- Ongoing Applications- accepted on a rolling basis
- Process to Apply
  - Pre-application: Eligibility, project basics
    - 60 days for SCC response
  - Invited Full Application: Project details, tasks and Budget
    - 60 days for SCC response
  - SCC Board approval
